INTEROFFICE MEMORANDUM

Issue

Staff would like to start a local adjudication program, rather than prosecute ordinance violations and certain traffic offenses through the circuit court system.

Discussion

Currently, all traffic tickets, and some ordinance violations where a subject requests a hearing, are being prosecuted either through the village attorney or the Kane County State's Attorney's office in the circuit court. On a typical prepaid \$120.00 fine for a speeding ticket, the village will receive approximately \$15.00 after the money is divided up amongst other entities. This process is complicated even more when a citation is prosecuted in court and a fine, plus court costs are assessed. Each time a case is prosecuted in the courts, fines from the violations are divided up among several different parties. There can be as many as eighteen categories that the fine is being separated amongst.

If the Village were to switch to an administrative hearing process to adjudicate, or settle, violations of Village ordinances, many of which are heard in the Aurora Branch Court, they would be held locally by a hearing officer. By doing this, the village would receive a larger percentage of the fine amount on each violation. Resolution to violations would also be expedited. The types of cases the hearing officer might hear are:

Police-issued citation (non-moving)

Parking tickets

Animal violations

Administrative tows and impound

The way we operate now, officers have to go to court each time a ticket is being contested. This means typically going to the Aurora Branch Court. With administrative hearings, cases are heard on a specific date at a pre-determined facility and officers do not have to appear. This would lower court costs and overtime for

the village. Fines from the ordinance violations and tickets would then come to the village and not be divided up amongst other entities

Staff received quotes from three different vendors for software that allows users to issue tickets, run reports, complete administrative tow paperwork, track tickets and hearing appearances, collect fines and send non-paid violations to collections. The following are the three software vendors:

DACRA

The DACRA company software contains everything in one system that is required to issue tickets, perform administrative tows, track tows, send owners/drivers paperwork for tows, track hearing information, and send unpaid fines to collections. The system would also replace an outdated electronic ticketing system currently used by the Kane County Clerk, which will no longer be in use soon. The system also combines police and code enforcement, should the village ever want to put both departments on the same system. The monthly cost for the DACRA system is \$1,500.00, plus \$2.00 for each citation and \$2.00 for each case that receives a disposition at an administrative hearing. There is no additional cost for training and implementation. DACRA is also cloud based, so no server would need to be dedicated to running it. (See attached key features)

QUICKET

With Quicket, an additional module would have to be purchased for the adjudication platform, pushing the cost from \$1,700 month for the electronic ticketing and crash reporting, to \$2970.00 for everything needed to run the ticketing and adjudication process.

MSI

The combination for the Municipal Offense System (MOS) and Municipal Offense Violation Enforcement (MOVE) and mobile electronic ticketing would cost \$1,050.00 per month, with one time fees for setup for \$2,000.00 and training for \$2,500.00.

Conclusion

Staff is seeking to adopt a system in which an administrative hearing process can be implemented by the Village. Staff is recommending using the DACRA software to run everything related to the process for the following reasons:

- Convenient Hearing Times
- Better Compliance-Fewer Warnings Written
- Relieves Overcrowded Circuit Court Dockets
- Contest by Mail/Internet
- Impartial-Independent Attorneys w/ Special Training
- Officer Need Not Be Present-Court Overtime Savings
- Fines Stay In Community
- Shifts Cost of Enforcement From Taxpayer to Violator
- Saves Officers Time

The other two systems would be either more costly, or does not have what would be required to run an effective adjudication system. DACRA is based out of Elgin and several area departments use the program (Kane County Recorder, Kendall County Clerk, Elgin PD, South Elgin PD, Hanover Park PD). Based on warnings and tickets written already this year, it is estimated the village could see approximately \$146,352.00 in revenue by changing to this process. That is \$57,347.00 more than last year under the current system.



Administrative Adjudication Fact Sheet

What is "Administrative Adjudication?"

- An alternative to the circuit court system authorized by state statute, providing counties and local municipalities a more efficient way to prosecute a wide range of minor violations.
- o Frees up the circuit court to focus on more serious offenses.
- o Easier system to navigate for violators who wish to contest a citation.

<u>Issue</u>

Staff would like to start prosecuting DUI arrests with a local prosecutor, rather than through the state's attorney's office.

Discussion

Currently, all DUI arrests are prosecuted through the state's attorney's office. The assistant state's attorney sets all court dates for the officers who have to testify for each DUI. An officer's schedule is not taken into consideration when the court date is set. Often, several officers will get subpoenaed for a case, and the case will then get continued multiple times, resulting in multiple court appearances for the officer(s). This causes overtime, as well as disruption to the officer's schedule. Another issue by continuing to prosecute DUI arrests this way is that the fines violators have to pay as a penalty get divided up into at least twelve different areas. This significantly reduces the amount of fine money coming to the arresting police department. Typically, North Aurora is seeing an average of \$350.00 per arrest.

If the village were to switch to a system of using a private attorney for local DUI prosecution, the attorney would be able to schedule court dates around each officer's schedule, thereby, reducing overtime costs and scheduling conflicts. Multiple appearances would not have to be made, as the attorney typically reaches an agreement on the DUI arrest during the first court appearance. The fine amounts also almost entirely come to the village. The amount does not get divided up like it does when the state prosecutes the case. Switching to local prosecution would allow the village to collect fines for violations under the Illinois Vehicle Code. Typically, a minimum DUI fine is \$750.00, and reaches a maximum of \$2,500.00. At present, the village sees very little revenue from the \$350.00 per DUI, despite the extensive training and manpower hours dedicated to the task.

In 2017, the police department made 69 DUI arrests. Assuming a 100% conviction rate and the \$350.00 fine assessment, the village would likely have seen approximately \$24,150.00. Under local prosecution, considering a 100% conviction rate and an average fine of \$1,625.00, the amount for the same 69 DUI arrests would have been \$112,125.00 (before prosecutor costs).

Conclusion

Staff is seeking to use a local prosecutor for future DUI prosecution. By going to this system, the village can save money on court costs, officer's schedules can be taken into account for trials, and more fine money is received by the village. If approved, qualified attorney(s) will be presented to the board to act as the local prosecutor.
